ANN: 이제 시작하겠습니다.

**1번 대화를 듣고, 여자가 구입할 안경을 고르시오.**

M: Katie, are you looking for something on the Internet?

W: Yes, I'm looking for glasses for our Halloween party on Friday.

M: Let me see. Wow! These ones with the pumpkin-shaped frames look perfect.

W: Right, but they're sold out. And I'd prefer round or square frames this year.

M: I think round frames are better than square ones.

W: Okay. Then I prefer these round ones with decorations over the lens. The ones without decorations are too simple.

M: Good idea. Look! There are two types of decorations. How about the ones with small pumpkins?

W: They're too ordinary for this party. I want to look different.

M: I think the frames with witch decorations will make you look special.

W: You're right! I'll get them.

**2번 대화를 듣고, 두 사람의 관계로 가장 적절한 것을 고르시오.**

W: Look at the ceiling over there. It's been wet since last month.

M: Let me check. Hmm... I'm afraid water is leaking from the upstairs bathroom.

W: Really? What should I do then?

M: Well, I have to look at the pipes for the upstairs bathroom, but you should discuss the problem with your upstairs neighbor first.

W: Okay. Are you sure water is really leaking?

M: Almost certainly, ma'am. If it isn't leaking, the ceiling wouldn't be wet for such a long time.

W: I see. Do you know who's responsible for this problem, me or the people upstairs?

M: I think they should have the problem fixed for you.

W: It's good to hear that.

M: Are there any other things you want me to take care of?

W: No. Everything else is fine.

3번 다음을 듣고, 여자가 하는 말의 주제로 가장 적절한 것을 고르시오.

W: We all know that some foods taste better than other foods, but how can we tell the tastes apart? If you eat a piece of potato and a piece of apple while holding your nose, it's hard to tell the difference between them. Why? It's because, if you can't smell, your sense of taste recognizes only salty, sweet, bitter, and sour flavors. But when your senses of taste and smell are combined, you can recognize many other complex, subtle tastes. If you take away your sense of smell, your brain can hardly tell the difference in taste between foods.

4번 대화를 듣고, 남자가 할 일로 가장 적절한 것을 고르시오.

W: Hi, David. You look really excited. Something good happened?

M: Oh, Debbie! I found my wallet at the lost-and-found office. I lost it a couple of hours ago.

W: Great! Is anything missing?

M: My money, my student card, and everything else is still in it.

W: Good for you! A very kind person must have found your wallet.

M: Oh, wait a second. My locker key is missing.

W: Is it? Did you check inside your wallet carefully?

M: The key was hanging on a string from the wallet, but it's gone.

W: Well... there is a spare key in the school office. You can get it copied.

M: Oh, right. I'll do that right away.

5번 대화를 듣고, 여자가 알고 싶어 한 전화번호의 뒷자리 숫자를 고르시오.

W: Robin, do you have Mr. Franklin's phone number?

M: Don't you already have it?

W: I thought I did, but I got the wrong number. Is it 2867-1275?

M: Hang on.

W: I called him to ask a question, but the person who picked up said it was the wrong number.

M: Really? It's... 2867-2267.

W: 2-2-6-7? No. That's his old number.

M: Really?

W: Didn't you write it down in your notebook when he wrote his new number on the blackboard the other day?

M: Ah, right. Where is my notebook? [*pause*] Oh! Here it is. It's 2867-1-2-5-7.

W: Oh! Ha, ha! I mistook 1257 for 1275.

M: Well, it happens all the time.

6번 대화를 듣고, 남자의 의견으로 가장 적절한 것을 고르시오.

W: Did you hear the news?

M: What news are you talking about?

W: I heard that we're supposed to wear our school uniform on Graduation Day!

M: What's wrong with that? I really like that idea.

W: I don't want to look the same as the other students. I'd like to look special on this kind of special occasion.

M: You mean you can't look special if you wear your school uniform?

W: Exactly!

M: But, once we graduate, we will never have a chance to wear our school uniform again.

W: That's true, but I think I should be the one to choose what to wear.

M: Well, my opinion is totally different from yours.

7번 다음을 듣고, 남자가 소개하는 프로그램에 관한 내용과 일치하지 않는 것을 고르시오.

M: Good evening, listeners! Here is some good information for the residents of Melton city. Melton city is launching a free program called Mother Goose for parents and their children. It is a program to help parents and children develop their relationships. This program focuses on activities with songs and stories. There are no toys or puppets, just language, eye contact, and gentle movement to connect parents and children. It is a ten-week group experience. 8번 대화를 듣고, 남자가 여자에게 부탁한 일로 가장 적절한 것을 고르시오.

M: Ms. Wilson. Do you have a minute?

W: Sure, Jason. Come on in.

M: You know, we're planning a special edition for the school newspaper, don't you?

W: I heard about it. What is special about this edition?

M: We're going to run stories about our teachers' school days.

W: Sounds interesting.

M: I heard that you were a chief editor when you were a high school student. I'm wondering if you would write a story about that.

W: Well... do you think that story would be interesting to the readers?

M: I'm sure they'd like it.

W: Okay. When is the draft due?

M: I'll email more specific draft information to you this afternoon.

9번 다음을 듣고, Alaska에서 일 년 중 낮이 가장 긴 날을 고르시오.

M: Hello. I'm Jason Cooper, and I'm from Alaska. Visitors often ask me when the best time to visit Alaska is. Well, you can't go wrong visiting Alaska anytime between May 10 and September 15. On average, Alaska's summers are slightly rainier than those of the rest of the U.S. May is dry, but Alaska gets rainier as the summer progresses, and by August it rains a lot. And June 21 is the longest day of the year, with 18 to 22 hours of daylight, giving visitors more time to enjoy Alaska. I would recommend the period from June 15 to July 15 to people who want to visit Alaska.

W: Then how about a Deluxe or a Premier room? Both of them have an ocean view.

M: How much are they?

W: Deluxe is 150 dollars a day, and Premier is 200 dollars.

M: Premier seems too expensive. I'll take a Deluxe room then. Can I use the Internet?

W: Sure. It'll cost you an additional ten dollars. Is that okay with you?

M: Yes. I'll take it.

12번 다음을 듣고, 여자가 하는 말의 요지로 가장 적절한 것을 고르시오.

W: I've taught many music students, and one of the rules I always emphasize is: if you want to be a successful musician, you shouldn't be afraid of making a mistake. This rule comes from my observation that poor musicians are often reluctant to be bold players because they're too shy or timid. These musicians are afraid of making mistakes. They hide behind the music of the band, hoping that the conductor or audience won't notice that they are playing so softly. The band, however, can't be strong without the total contribution of each player.
